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



Stow-Aways: Memories of the Past by Beth Daugherty

n 1978, the classes of Stow High School teacher Garnet Byrne, interviewed local residents and recorded their memories of growing up and living in Stow, as well as Darrowville, Metz, and Munroe Falls. The interviews were published, and Stow Historical Society continues to sell copies of *Stow-Aways*. These memories continue to enlighten us on life in early Stow from pioneer days to the early twentieth century. Some excerpts from the book include:
