

Old Schoolhouse Update

It has been a long winter and a hard one from a weather standpoint. As a result no physical work has been accomplished on the OSH during the winter. The shrub gardens planted last fall have survived the winter and have been weeded. The top item on the January OSH Priority List was to get electricity into the OSH. In January the OSH Electrical Specs were revised. We solicited bids from three electrical contractors that do work for the City. All three responded and we selected a contractor to provide the electrical service to the OSH. We also selected a contractor to do the internal wiring of the OSH. The bids were presented to the SHS Board at the June 8th meeting, and two contracts were awarded. The City must now install the underground conduit for the service cable. This will be done soon, and then the contractor can install the cable and the circuit breaker box in the OSH. This will provide the power we need to have lights and run power tools.

The first work day plan has been made but remains to be scheduled. We are in need of additional funds to continue the interior restoration of the OSH. I have made an OSH presentation to a Stow Group considering giving us a donation. I also gave a tour to local people that have a foundation. The tour resulted in getting an application for a grant from the foundation. The Interior Restoration Team had a planning meeting and is perusing a grant from Ohio Humanities Council. Because we do not have individual estimates to finish all aspects of the interior, we are estimating that we will need at least \$40 to \$50 thousand additional funds. Please call me if you know of any additional sources for these funds. There will be many opportunities to volunteer your time and talents this summer, on both the Construction Team and the Internal Restoration Team, so do NOT hesitate to call me. Thank You.

(Taken from the "Stow -Aways" interview with Floyd Darrow, circa 1977)

Darrowville was first called Darrow Street. All the homes in the area faced the Cleveland-Pittsburgh Stage Road, which is now Rt. 91. Darrowville became the official name in 1890 when the area acquired its first post office. Darrowville was founded by Joseph Darrow, who first came to the area in 1799 with David Hudson. Joseph surveyed Stow Township in1804. His surveying tools include a compass and a half-length Gunther's chain, measuring 33 feet long and having 50 links. 160 half chains make one mile. Consider that Stow Township was five miles east to west and about 4 1/2 miles north to south. Imagine the difficulties encountered in surveying a rugged territory before there were roads and settlements. Joseph married Sally Pryor in 1803 and became a landowner in 1806. He was a hunter and trapper and at one time followed two bears, eventually crawling into their cave with his rifle. He was rewarded with 300 pounds of bear meat! Joseph and Sally had thirteen children. Floyd Darrow was their great-great grandson. Floyd remembered the hardships of his ancestors: "My great-great-grandfather, Joseph Darrow, really had it rough. When he got ready to build his house, he found that the closest place he could buy nails was Pittsburgh. So he took two horses. He rode one; and on each side of the other horse he put a keg of nails and rode back with those nails. In those days there weren't any roads, just Indian trails. It is hard to imagine anyone going all the way from Darrowville to Pittsburgh just to purchase nails."
