I also was able to study the condition of the cultural heritage objects themselves. I recorded my observations and recommendations for the preservation of the collection in the Preservation Assessment that I submitted to both my instructor and the Stow Historical Society. I was overall very impressed by the effort and care that the Stow Historical Society has put into ensuring that the objects included in the Heritage House collection are well preserved. I hope to continue to be involved in the Stow Historical Society in the future!  $\diamond$

## History of Stow Parks by Beth Daugherty

ike all of the Connecticut Western Reserve, Stow Township was originally a wilderness, and there was no need for parks in the early 1800's. But as Stow and surrounding communities grew in population and became less rural, it became apparent that there was a need for more green space and recreational areas. One of the first people to recognize this was Ralph H. Lodge, who purchased Silver Lake (formerly Stow Lake or Wetmore's Pond) and land around it in 1876. At that time Silver Lake was still part of Stow Township.

Mr. Lodge developed Silver Lake Park on the shores of beautiful Silver Lake as a picnic spot. Eventually this quaint spot became an extensive amusement park with a dance hall, a dining hall, a small menagerie (with bears), swim lake, a hotel, a roller-coaster, and an aquarium. Locals and out-of-towners flocked to the park. The Summit County Farmers Institute had their annual picnic there, and people from Akron and elsewhere arrived by train. Attendance reached over 10,000 a day during the peak years. The arrival of World War I and lack of transportation (no more train service) conspired to shut down Silver Lake Park,

and its final season ended in September 1917. The park property was sold and houses built on it. William Lodge went on to become mayor of the newly developed Village of Silver Lake. The park aquarium lives on in the bricks of the

New Apostolic Church (formerly the Community Church of Stow), located on Elm Road.


Another visionary who saw the need for green space was Homer Campbell. Mr. Campbell was married to Lottie Durbin, daughter of Robert and Adell Durbin. Lottie's sister was Jessie, who married Don Williamson. In 1939 Homer donated 29 acres of land along Route 91 (Darrow Road) in Stow to be used as a municipal park. The park was in honor of his beloved mother-in-law, Adell Durbin. World War II postponed the development of the park, but it was finally opened in 1948 as the Adell Durbin Park and Arboretum. The first park manager was John Denning who oversaw

the construction of several buildings at the park. One of the buildings was the Wagon Shed, completed in 1950. For a time it was used by Stow Historical Society for a meeting place and to store historical artifacts. The park's original two lodges were named for Mr. Campbell and Mr. Denning. Howard Gaylord, great-grandson of Munroe Falls Pioneer Jonathon Gaylord Jr., was in charge of security for the park in the early years. Adell Durbin was, and still remains, a popular park in Stow. Many scout meetings, tennis matches, play dates, and family reunions have taken place there.

The City of Stow purchased the land for Silver Springs Park in 1967. The Silver Springs campground in the northeastern portion of the park has been operated by the Parks and Recreation Department since 1976

and is one of only a few municipally-operated campgrounds in Ohio. Ken Barnhart has served as park attendant for over forty years. Silver Springs is the largest (280 acres) of Stow's Parks, with hiking trails, tennis and basketball courts, baseball and softball fields, picnic areas, and two lodges. The Leona Farris Lodge (formerly Silver Springs Lodge) at 5027 Stow Road and the Heritage Barn (home base of Stow Players and site of the annual Stow Historical Society Harvest Festival) at 5238 Young Road, are both available for rentals. Heritage Barn is part of the Heritage Reserve Park area of the park, accommodating the historic buildings maintained and operated by Stow Historical Society. Adults and children enjoyed the swimming at the Silver Springs lake for many years. Bow Wow Beach, Stow's dog park, officially opened in June 2007 and is very popular with residents and their pooches.

Stow has several smaller neighborhood parks. The earliest of these was the five acre Wetmore Park, dedicated in 1919. Located on Route 59 between Silver Lake and Stow, it is named for the Wetmore family, early pioneers of Stow Township. The original home of Judge William Wetmore, Joshua Stow's land agent who arrived with a large party of settlers in 1804, still stands nearby. Another notable neighborhood park is Meadowbrook Lake. Sarah Hibbard Amlung, a charter member of Stow Historical Society, along with her husband and brothers, donated the 19-acre lake to the city of Stow in 1966. The property had been part of the family farm located on Hibbard Drive. The lake is surrounded by residences of the Meadowbrook allotment, but is available to the public for fishing. The public entrance to Meadowbrook is at 5069 Hudson Drive. A playground, basketball courts, and picnic area are also available.

Another Stow green space worthy of mention is the Stow Sancturetum, which now includes the Akron General Wellness Walking Trails at Stow City Center. This lovely arboretum was first opened June 29, 2006. The sixteen-acre nature preserve was created on property owned by Paul and Barbara Coleman and acquired by the City of Stow. The Colemans were very active in Stow Historical Society, with Paul being president of SHS in the 1970's. The Colemans built a house on the property, then owned by Roy and Nina Parpat, in 1959. Nancy Kroft, another long-time SHS member, was president of FOSPAR (Friends of Stow Parks and Recreation) at the time of the dedication of the park.

When Joshua Stow first saw the land that was eventually to become Stow Township he described it as "one of the prettiest and most romantic spots in the Western Reserve." Thanks to the foresight of Stow's citizens and the City of Stow, the area still remains one of the prettiest in Northeast Ohio with its beautiful parks. •

# Stow Instanted Society Display at the Stow-Munroo Falls Public Library

tow Historical Society is currently exhibiting "Fashions of the Day" at Stow-Munroe Falls Public Library. This exhibit features seldom seen items from the Society's archives collection. The examples of late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century styles accentuate the importance of accessories when dressing for everyday or a special event. Men and women of that time dressed for the occasion with hats, gloves, hankies, pins, and gloves. A lady would most likely also carry a fan, and a gentleman might wear spats and carry a cane. "Fashions of the Day", located in the display cases directly behind the Information Desk, will remain on exhibit through Father's Day, June 19.
